#### Dr Lizzie Sutton - Class of 2013



#### **Alumni Spotlight**

We really are lucky in that there are so many fabulous, inspiring, interesting stories that are shared with us about the lives of Queen's students after they embark on their own adventures. Here is just one.

#### Val Bannan, Class of 1974

After leaving Queen's in 1974, I went straight to university to study Music and attained my BA degree and a PGCE. Whilst there I met and married my husband Nick (also a musician); then taught classroom music in various girls' grammar and private schools; had three children and eventually became Head of Juniors at an independent school in Maidenhead, where I worked for twenty years.

My lessons always incorporated lots of singing and practical activities and, with the advent of the GCSE and the first National Curriculum, school music broadened to take in the vast domain of non-Western forms, and much more besides. Original composition was a central part of the curriculum across all age ranges, alongside skills in music technology, and I was delighted when I was appointed to a management role within my school, taking specific responsibility for the Junior department. I found a real affinity for working with 7 to 11 year-olds, and in teaching different subjects across the whole curriculum, while still being able to develop my choral and instrumental groups and direct musical productions. The best of all worlds!

Then, when my husband was offered a post at the University of Western Australia and we found ourselves relocating to Perth, I applied for and became a teacher in charge of music at a coeducational school of 3-13 year olds, which, for the final eight years of my career, entailed my learning all kinds of unfamiliar new skills, both musical and educational. I relished the experience but was more than ready to embrace retirement when I turned 60, giving me the chance to take more frequent trips back 'home' to catch up with our growing family of five grandchildren in the UK. When my husband finally retired too, at the end of 2020 (and what a year that had turned out to be!), we carried out our declared intention to return for good to live in the UK.

Living and working in Australia had been a great experience even though we had never previously anticipated, let alone planned, that our professional lives would take us 'Down Under'! It just goes to show that however much you think you have mapped out your career path, all that you can be sure of is that the unexpected will happen. When that occurs, all you can do is to call upon your prior experience, knowledge and understanding, to believe in yourself, accept the challenge and adapt!

In April this year, in Chester Town Hall, I became a Freeman of the City, an ancient legacy passed down to me through my grandfather. He had earned the right to join the Freemen & City Guilds of Chester as very young man in 1906, through having served his 'indentures' as an apprentice carpenter and joiner fo seven years. Amongst other local work, he was part of the team who restored the Cathedral refectory roof in the 1930's. For me, as a pupil at Queen's on a 'free place' under the old Direct Grant scheme, I personally benefitted after the untimely death of my own father when I was only aged 12. The Owen Jones charity, having connections both with The Queen's School and with the City Companies of Chester, awarded me a small annual to pay for my instrumental music lessons So it was with both pleasure and gratitude that I was able formally to receive and

accept my 'Freedom' of Chester from the Mayor at the annual Pentice Court ceremony this year.

The new Headmistress, Mrs Joanne Keville, spoke at our recent alumna lunch party about the importance of the bursary fund to the school I, for one, would never have been able to attend as a pupil if it hadn't been for the postwar Direct Gran scheme. I worked hard to justify my free place, became the Queen's Jubilee Scholar in my final year, and was one of the ten (ten!) Sixth formers in 1974 to gain a place of Oxford or Cambridge (back in the days when all university tuition fees were paid by the local authority - what a fortunate generation we were!). Throughout my subsequent career, I've done my best to pass on to my own pupils the quality of teaching, pastoral support and personal encouragement I myself received at Queen's. Despite all the economic difficulties that exist these days, it's good to see that the school continues to flourish.



#### **Archive News**

Our rich heritage and history is something we hold dear at Queen's and are very proud of especially as we approach our 150th anniversary. As such we are delighted that, with help from professional archivist volunteers, alumni and the Cheshire Records Office, we are embarking on an exciting project.

There will be a thorough assessment to determine the contents and needs of the collection, cataloguing of items, and plans to:

- 1. Group similar items and create a preliminary inventory list with essential details.
- 2 Implement systematic organisation with a classification system, assigning unique identifiers to each item, and creating detailed records in a digital database for easy retrieval.
- Digitize much of the collection, creating high-resolution scans stored in a secure digital archive to preserve the originals and make them shareable and searchable.
- 4. Implement preservation measures, such as acid-free folders, protective sleeves, and climate-controlled storage to prevent deterioration and ensure long-term preservation.
- 5. I have also begun developing user guidelines on proper handling and documentation to maintain the archive's organisation.

This project aims to preserve the rich history of The Queen's School with Cheshire Records Office supporting us. We will still have full access to our collection and any

further donations, so please continue to send us anything related to the history of The Queen's School. Any donations are welcome, and please feel free to contact us at alumni@thequeenschool.co.uk to discuss anything archive related.









#### IN REMEMBRANCE



Denise Pinto (nee Whitehead), Class of 1966, died on 17th September 2023. Denise attended Queen's from 1979 to 1986. She played the flute, debated and excelled at languages both French and German. She went on to Cambridge University and a successful career in law, both as a Solicitor and latterly running her own niche business advising on university contracts.

Denise had fought cancer for many years and was brave and stoic in its face. She died in hospital in London, with her husband and four children by her side.

Brenda Hughes (nee Boden), Class of 1964, unexpectedly passed away in June 2023.

Her son shared that Brenda had very fond memories of the school and had visited in recent years. After leaving school and marrying; Brenda moved to London in the late sixties and had two children.

Brenda enjoyed a short stint in banking, before pursuing a career in private aviation. She enjoyed a rich life – travelling often with her family, skiing with friends and spending time outside with her loyal dogs.

Norma Pullen (née Young) sadly died suddenly on 4 April 2023. A couple of months later her husband, Glenn, also died. While clearing their house her daughters came upon a big box of old photographs of classmates which, fortunately, Norma thought to collect names of (most of) the girls and the date is included - 27/7/1958. Any photographs received will be added to our archive collection.

Liz Rowland, now Liz Afia shares that her elder daughter **Pippa Rowland**, who was at Nedham House and left Queens in 1990 to study Commerce at Birmingham University, died in February 23 from cancer.

Mary Brown (Walling), Class of 1951, passed in January 2021 in Victoria, Vancouver Island Canda. Her husband Roy shared a great deal of information and said that Mary had told him that she had many friends at The Queen's School and often reminisced about her school life. He said she was very grateful for these experiences and often referred to them as they helped her in later life. Mary was also interested in music and took lessons while at The Queen's School.
